VISION

The Executive Council of the University of Delhi decided to establish Centre for Tribal Studies (CTS) on 9 June 2023 as a multi-disciplinary centre under Faculty of Social Sciences, to facilitate studies on different tribes of India as per Ordinance XX (Z). The office bearers were appointed on 1st August 2023. The Centre is currently located at Room no. 30 of the Department of Anthropology, University of Delhi.

The Centre attempts to:

- (i) Understand the term "Tribe" from India-Centric perspective including study of their social, cultural, linguistic, religious, economic, environmental diversity and commonalities.
- (ii) Study the role and contribution of tribal leaders in various eras of Indian history.
- (iii) Highlight role and significance of tribal leaders in India's struggle for freedom, and bring out to prominence the unsung heroes among them.
- (iv) Document various Lok traditions of India's tribes including their indigenous/traditional knowledge and work to disseminate such information to the public in general and to academia and students in particular.
- (v) Identify special problems and needs of Denotified and Nomadic tribes and Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTGs) with special reference to conservation, development and special health needs.
- (vi) Examine the significance of forest-tribe relationship with special reference to stability of forest ecosystems and livelihood issues.
- (vii) Study contemporary issues relevant to the tribal communities which has a significant bearing on their present well-being and future progression in terms of overall developmental perspective.

Janjatiya Gaurav Diwas | 15 November 2023

The Centre for Tribal Studies celebrated 'Janjatiya Gaurav Diwas' on November 15, 2023, to commemorate the birth anniversary of Bhagwan Birsa Munda, in collaboration with the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts (IGNCA).

During the event, Prof. Shri Prakash Singh, Chairperson, Governing Body of the Centre and Director, South Campus emphasised the vital role of the Centre for Tribal Studies at Delhi University, in the context of lack of awareness within academia and the broader public regarding the tribals' significant contributions to India's independence struggle. He announced a substantial seed grant of 50 lakhs for the centre, with forthcoming fellowships and projects aimed at fortifying research and documentation of India's tribes.

Chief Guest Prof. Balaram Pani highlighted the discipline and precision exhibited by Bhagwan Birsa Munda at a young age. Drawing parallels, he elucidated the scientific knowledge possessed by tribal communities iron technology and construction of ancient temples.

Renowned folk artist and theatre director Shri. Anirudha D. Wankar delivered an enlightening lecture on '*Zhadipatti Rangbhoomi*,' illustrating how folk art serves as a means to express the life stories and contributions of tribal heroes like Bhagwan Birsa Munda.

Prof. S.M. Patnaik, Director of the Centre for Tribal Studies, emphasised the need for an India-centric approach to the study of tribes, outlining the vision for the newly established centre. He stressed the idea of interdisciplinary to make tribal studies holistic and meaningful.

Exhibition

An exhibition titled 'The Contribution of Tribal Leaders of India in Nation-Building', was presented, highlighting the culturally significant heritage of tribal leadership.

Film Screening

Ethnographic films focused on the indigenous knowledge systems of tribes were also screened, providing a comprehensive view of their cultural significance.

Students from tribal communities, enrolled in various courses, actively took part in the event donning their traditional attire.

Special Talk | 24 November 2023

'Memories of the tribal heroes in the freedom struggle and nation building'

On 24 November 2023 (afternoon), the Head of the Janapada Sampada Division, Indira Gandhi National Centre for Arts, Prof Anil Kumar, who belongs to the Pradhan tribe in Telangana, delivered a special talk on 'Memories of the tribal heroes in the freedom struggle and nation building'. In his deliberation, he appealed to the participants to be empathetic towards the causes of the tribes. He said that understanding of the contemporary Indian tribes needs a new terminology. The term 'Jana' or 'Janajati' comes closer to the etymology of tribal reality. Quoting Harsh Chouhan, the former chairperson of the National Commission of Scheduled Tribes, he said that even the 'Janajati Samuha' could be another possibility. The present-day discourse needs to be centred around decolonizing the concept of tribe.


Millennium Water Story: Practising Visual Anthropology for Water Sustainability'

The project 'The Millennium Water Story' stands as a testament to dedication towards knowledge creation for a sustainable future through the powerful medium of visual storytelling. In a world where the concept of sustainable development often seems like an oxymoron, social scientists are at the forefront, striving to bridge the gap between theory and practice, especially through a bottom-up approach. Through insightful photo essays on different tribal communities from Rajasthan and Nagaland, the speakers effectively showcased the intricacies and challenges of water sustainability in diverse contexts.


What sets this work apart is the deliberate choice of using black and white photography, which serves as a poignant representation of the complexities of life and the gravity of the water crisis. By stripping away the distractions of colour, they allow viewers to focus solely on the essence of the issue at hand. Through this monochromatic lens, they highlight not only the stark realities of water scarcity but also the resilience and resourcefulness of communities in managing local water resources.

One of the key insights gleaned from their work is the critical role of social capital in the management of indigenous water recharging technologies. Through their visually compelling narratives, the speakers effectively demonstrate how communities harness collective knowledge and social networks to implement sustainable water management practices. Their project serves as a powerful reminder of the importance of community-based approaches in addressing complex environmental challenges and paves the way for future research and action in the field of water sustainability.







Celebrating the Constitution Day: 26 November 2024

Centre for Tribal Studies and Department of Anthropology celebrated 78 years of India's democracy on the occasion of 26th November 2024, which is celebrated as Constitution Day. On this occasion, a panel discussion was organised with the purpose of making the students and other stakeholders aware of the fact that how the edifice of the nation is based on the Constitution of India.

In the beginning, Ms. Sonuja Nandinee Barik, PhD research scholar of the department, read out the preamble, setting the tone for the session. It was followed by an enlightening session. The panellists identified important attributes of the constitution by treating it as the most sacred text of India's democracy (Prof. R.P. Mitra). It marked that the constitution is the synthesis of the orientation of diverse cultures as far as the rule of law is concerned (Dr. D.V. Prasad) and that the individual responsibility as a good citizen constitutes the hallmark of constitutional values (Dr. Kennedy Singh). It also highlighted how Fundamental Rights as enshrined in the constitution need certain preconditions in terms of responsibility towards the nation (Dr Vipin Gupta), and the very fact that the Indian constitution has survived the test of time making us feel that it is not only a mere text but represents the very identity of Indians (Dr Mitashree Srivastava). Following this, Ms Sudeshna Biswas, a senior research scholar of the department, read out the eleven fundamental duties to awaken a sense of duty.

The names of fifteen extraordinary women who were part of the constituent committee and their significant contributions were also discussed (Dr Abigail Lalnuneng). The constitutional provisions under the Fifth and Sixth Schedule, for the administration of Scheduled Tribes and Area, ensuring the protection of their interest was read out by Ms. Sandhya Bhatt, research scholar of the department. The panel discussion was attended by faculty members of the department, interns connected to the Centre for Tribal Studies and students of Department of Physics and Chemistry who are pursuing common papers in Anthropology along with students of Forensic Science. Prof. S M. Patnaik, Director, Centre for Tribal Studies chaired the session. He concluded the panel discussion emphasizing that we need to pay our sincere gratitude to members of the Constituent Assembly, especially to the drafting committee headed by Dr. B. R. Ambedkar. He also pointed out that there is a need to organise a national consultation on the Tribes and the Indian Constitution. Mr. Dileep Kumar, research scholar of the department, facilitated the Oath of Allegiance on behalf of everyone revering the importance of the Constitution. The event concluded with the National Anthem by all.




National Conference on 'INDIAN TRIBES, CONSTITUTION, AND GOVERNANCE' 25-26 March 2025



Research and Education Plans

The Centre for Tribal Studies shall seek to roll out research and education plans that involve the following tentative Research Projects and activities:

- i) Role of Tribal Leaders in India's Freedom Struggle: This research project aims to explore the often-overlooked contributions of tribal leaders to India's struggle for freedom. The research will examine historical records, oral histories, and archival materials to provide a comprehensive understanding of the diverse ways in which tribal leaders across different regions of India actively participated in and influenced the freedom movement.
- ii) Ethnographic study of tribal communities. This kind of research will involve ethnographic fieldwork to document and analyse the various rituals, ceremonies, and cultural practices that are pertinent in maintaining social cohesion, identity, and spirituality within tribal societies. Restudies of classical ethnographies of Indian tribes would be theoretically and methodologically innovative.
- iii) *Indigenous Knowledge Systems*: Various methods shall be used to document indigenous knowledge systems, i.e., traditional medicinal practices, ecological knowledge, biodiversity and traditional craftsmanship, among tribal communities. This research seeks to safeguard and rejuvenate endangered cultural traditions while promoting the transfer of knowledge between generations.
- iv) Development Interventions on Tribal Livelihoods: This research will examine the impact of development projects such as infrastructure development, conservation initiatives, and social welfare programs, on the livelihoods and socio-economic wellbeing of tribal communities. The benefits, challenges, and unintended consequences of such interventions will be explored in detail.

Proposed asks

Collaborations and Partnerships

Research collaboration has been agreed upon in principle with the Centre for Endangered Languages, Central University of Jharkhand, Ranchi. Research partnership is being worked out with other Research institutions. Fostering meaningful collaborations with tribal communities, government agencies, NGOs, academic partners, media organizations, and international networks, by engaging in the following activities:

- i) Organising workshops in collaboration with tribal communities to understand their needs and aspirations. These workshops will serve as platforms for dialogue, co-creation, and partnership building, ensuring that research and outreach activities are informed by community perspectives and participation.
- ii) Make strategic partnerships with relevant government agencies, such as the Ministry of Tribal Affairs and State-level tribal welfare departments, State Tribal Research Institutes, tribal universities to leverage resources, expertise, and networks for the implementation of research projects and policy advocacy initiatives which will eventually lead to the promotion of the rights, well-being, and development of tribal communities.
- iii) Collaborate with non-governmental organisations (NGOs), civil society organizations, and grassroots movements working on tribal issues to strengthen the Centre's research and outreach activities.
- iv) Establish collaborations with academic institutions, research centres, and scholars working on tribal studies to promote interdisciplinary research, knowledge exchange, and capacity building. This can be achieved by organizing joint research seminars, conferences, and publications, facilitating collaboration and mutual learning among researchers and practitioners from diverse disciplinary backgrounds.
- v) Partner with media organizations to disseminate research findings, raise awareness, and promote greater public understanding and empathy.

DU sets up Centre for Tribal Studies

To mark the International Day of the World's Indigenous People, Delhi University announced the establishment of the Centre for Tribal Studies (CTS) on Wednesday. In a statement, the university said the CTS would work towards understanding the diversity of tribal practices, culture, language, religion, economy, commonalities and relationship with nature through an India-centric perspective. It has appointed Soumendra Mohan Patnaik, Head, Department of Anthropology, as the Director of the new centre and Avitoli G. Zhimo, Associate Professor, Department of Anthropology, as the Joint Director. At present, the CTS will function from the Department of Anthropology and DU said it aspires to provide insightful academic impetus to public policy with special reference to conservation, development, forest, and special health needs.

"The inception of the Centre for Tribal Studies will be a transformative step in advancing and addressing the contemporary issues relevant to the tribal communities in terms of their overall development and well-being in present as well as in future progression. "The establishment of the CTS will endeavour in highlighting the role and contribution of many tribal leaders throughout Indian history and also bring to light the efforts of many unsung tribal leaders in India's struggle for freedom," the university said.

It added that the centre will get inputs from two external experts, T.V. Kattimani, Vice-Chancellor, Central Tribal University of Andhra Pradesh, and Chander Mohan Parsheera, Director, Institute of Tribal Studies, Himachal Pradesh University. "CTS will study and document various traditions of Indian tribes and their indigenous knowledge. It will also play a pivotal role in bridging the gap between the needs of Denotified, Nomadic tribes, and Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTGs)," it added.
